



Green light for Optobiology Center: Construction work begins on North Campus

At a time characterised by massive cost-cutting measures in the university sector, a positive decision has been made on the subject of university construction: the main committee of the Berlin House of Representatives has given the green light for the new optobiology research building on the North Campus. The construction costs will be borne jointly by the federal government and the state of Berlin. The new Optobiology Center of HU and Charité - Universitätsmedizin Berlin will provide space for cutting-edge interdisciplinary research. 110 scientists will research the interaction between light and organisms as well as medical light applications on 3,900 square meters of floor space. Construction work under the direction of the Senate Department for Urban Development, Building and Housing will begin at the end of February with the demolition of the old stables. During the four-year construction period, there will be restrictions on the North Campus. From 3 March, access to the North Campus via Claire-Waldoff-Straße and Reinhardtstraße/Panketor/Bunker will be closed.

Capital city allowance: Universities and trade unions at odds

The capital city allowance collective agreement is a supplementary collective agreement to the collective agreement for the federal states, which was negotiated in November 2024 and will come into force on 1 April 2025. Whether this also applies to Berlin's universities is controversial. From the point of view of the Berlin universities and the Municipal Employers' Association, employees of the universities are not entitled to the bonus, as this is not a collective agreement covered by the takeover clauses. Therefore, no bonus will be paid to university employees as of 1 April. Unlike the Senate Administration itself and the state authorities, the Berlin Senate does not grant the universities and colleges any additional funds to finance a capital city allowance. The trade unions, on the other hand, are calling for the allowance to be paid. They rejected the universities' proposal to clarify the legal issue in a test case. The universities continue to press for a quick clarification.

Demonstration: For fewer cuts and more solidarity

On 22 February, many representatives of Berlin's universities responded to the call to take to the streets for good studies and secure employment as well as solidarity-based funding for Berlin. In particular, they criticised the drastic funding cuts by the Berlin Senate and the potential impact on universities. A broad alliance of trade unions, associations and initiatives had called for the "Berlin is uncuttable" demonstration. Around 5,000 people demonstrated in front of the Rotes Rathaus.

Employee Self Service: Digital retrieval of salary documents

Since January 2023, Humboldt-Universität employees have been able to retrieve their salary statements, social security registration certificates and income tax statements for previous calendar years (from 2023) via the Employee Self Service (ESS). The electronic wage tax statement for the 2024 calendar year and the 2024 annual social security return are also available in the ESS. It is not possible to retrieve documents in the ESS for periods prior to 1 January 2023.

Academic freedom: HU joins the declaration of the Gender Studies Association

Humboldt-Universität zu Berlin has endorsed the current declaration by the Gender Studies Association 'Resolutely countering attacks on the freedom of research and teaching'. The declaration was prompted by demands from the AfD to stop funding gender research. The Fachgesellschaft Geschlechterstudien views this demand as an attack on academic freedom, which is an indispensable component of democracy. Any restriction of academic freedom would not only harm academia, but society as a whole. Scientists at HU have been dealing with issues of women's and gender studies for more than four decades. Research and teaching in the field of gender studies in all participating disciplines at HU is now coordinated by the Centre for Transdisciplinary Gender Studies (ZtG), which brings together expertise from all areas.

History meets the future: Ancient plaster relief shows climate

century. It was made by the carpenter and topographer Joachim Eigen Müller and was once in the Kunstkammer of the Berlin Palace. Today, only a section remains, which is on display in the Humboldt Forum. A video combines the 3D model, which accurately recreates the Aletsch Glacier before it was destroyed by industry and tourism, with maps and data from climate research. The video shows how the glaciation of the Alps has decreased and expanded again over the millennia during alternating warm and cold periods - and how the ice has been melting ever faster since the beginning of the 20th century as a result of man-made global warming. In the 'International Year of Glacier Conservation', the film calls on us to do everything we can to stop climate change. The United Nations is also using the year to remind us that the melting of glaciers also jeopardises water supplies.
