



DFG review board election: Proportion of HU researchers has risen sharply

24 researchers will represent Humboldt-Universität on the review boards of the German Research Foundation (DFG) in the term of office from 2024 to 2028. They were selected from among the 649 review board members of the German Research Foundation (DFG). The HU will be represented by ten more researchers than in the expiring term of office. Particularly pleasing: the proportion of women has risen from 29 per cent to 42 per cent. In Berlin, HU is now the university most strongly represented in the review boards. The review boards are an important component of academic self-administration in the distribution of DFG funding. They evaluate research proposals to the DFG in a three-stage process and advise on the further development and design of the funding programmes.

Collective bargaining agreement: pay increase and inflation compensation

In the collective bargaining round for employees in the public sector of the federal states, the parties agreed on 9 December on an increase in table salaries and the payment of inflation compensation. The result provides for table salaries to increase by 200 euros on 1 November 2024 and by a further 5.5 percent on 1 February 2025, but by at least 340 euros. TV-L employees will also receive a tax and duty-free inflation compensation payment of 3,000 euros.

The physicist Erwin Schrödinger was undisputedly a brilliant scientist. He is regarded as one of the founders of quantum mechanics and was awarded the Nobel Prize for Physics in 1933. A few years ago, however, allegations of abuse against him were publicised. The HU invites all Humboldtians to the Adlershof campus on 5 February from 3 to 5:30 pm to discuss whether the physicist is still acceptable as the namesake of the Erwin Schrödinger Centre. The event will be held in English as part of the "HU in Dialogue" event series and in a world café format that combines the perspectives of experts and the participation of attendees.

Roll of honour and exhibition: The Slavicist Aleksander Brückner and his work

Aleksander Brückner was one of the most important researchers of Slavic, especially Polish, language, literature and culture in the Middle Ages and early modern period. He worked for over 44 years, from 1881 to 1924, as Professor of Slavic Studies at the Friedrich-Wilhelms-Universität in Berlin and established Berlin Slavic Studies as an independent philology. This week, a portrait of Brückner has been added to the HU's gallery of honour in the upper foyer of the main building. In addition, the exhibition "Aleksander Brückner. In Search of the Lost Middle Ages" in the east atrium introduces the philologist's multifaceted life's work. The exhibition, which was organised by the Institute of Slavic and Hungarian Studies, among others, is open daily from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. until 5 January 2024.

Humboldt-Universität is once again awarding scholarships from the Deutschlandstipendium programme for the 2024 summer semester. Ingenschay is a retired professor at Humboldt University, former president and honorary member of the German Hispanist Association and holder of the Order of Isabel la Católica.
