



Forward-looking: Lautarchiv receives funding for project with African partner institutions

The Lautarchiv of the HU will receive 344,890 euros in funding from the Deutsches Zentrum Kulturgutverluste for the research project "Towards Sonic Resocialisation" until February 2026. The focus is on 456 recordings of African prisoners of the First World War in German camps. The digitised material will be handed over to the Institut Fondamental d'Afrique Noire in Dakar and other African archives together with the corresponding historical written documentation. "We are planning an exchange with the source communities, will hire speakers from the countries of origin for translations and discuss critical issues together," says Christopher Li (Photo), head of the sound archive. "We are also planning to revise and decolonise the sound archive's metadata, which was created during the colonial era."

Tiburtius Prize: Nominate doctoral candidates by 15 May

Every year, the State Conference of Rectors and Presidents (LKRP) of Berlin's universities awards three prizes and three additional recognition prizes to doctoral students at Berlin's universities for outstanding dissertations and three prizes to graduates of Berlin's universities of applied sciences. Professors can nominate outstanding doctoral students for the Tiburtius Prize until 15 May. Prizes of up to 4,000 euros will be awarded.

Humboldt Award: nominate theses by 1 July

Students and junior researchers at HU have the opportunity to receive an award of up to 3,000 euros for very good theses. The Humboldt Prize is awarded for work completed in the past year. Deans (only they are entitled to nominate candidates) can nominate candidates until 1 July. Only one nomination per category (Bachelor's thesis, Master's thesis, dissertation) will be accepted per institute or monofaculty. Self-nominations are possible for the Innovation Award for the best "Research to Innovation" qualification work.

Object of the month: A miniature bust of the physicist Kirchhoff

A bust of the physicist Robert Gustav Kirchhoff (1824-1887), created in 1888 by the Berlin sculptor Carl Begas, is stored in the Kustodie's stacks. Until 1929, it stood in the row of other marble busts of honoured professors of the university in the old assembly hall in the main building of the university. To mark the 200th anniversary of Kirchhoff's birth, the bust was woken from its slumber and subjected to a 3D scan. A 3D print of the bust was created in 27 hours of printing time. Dr Christopher Degelmann has received the prestigious Heinz Maier-Leibnitz Prize 2024 from the German Research Foundation (DFG). Degelmann has been a visiting

professor of Ancient History at HU since 2023. With the prize, the DFG recognises the fact that the ancient historian combines historical and contemporary issues and thus makes the significance of our ancient heritage accessible for our modern selfunderstanding. The prize is endowed with 200,000 euros and is recognised as the most important award for researchers with outstanding achievements in the early stages of their careers.
