30 years of the Northern European Institute: Unrivalled in research, teaching and exchange

Email addresses: Renew user certificates in advance

Users who use a HU-PKI user certificate for their e-mail or functional address and whose validity period is about to expire are requested to issue a new certificate in advance. User certificates for e-mail and functional addresses are required for e-mail signature and encryption and are issued via the PKI service of the Computer and Media Service in self-service. As the service for reissuing certificates is no longer expected to be provided by Sectigo for an indefinite period from 10 January 2025, the PKI service urgently requests the early renewal of certificates with a short validity period.

KI: New tool summarises documents

The Computer and Media Service (CMS) provides all Humboldtians with a new AI tool that can be used to summarise texts from pdf and docx files. You can choose between a summary as a short version or a critical reflection of the original text. The original texts can be written in ten different languages, the summary is in German. In contrast to commercial offers, the use of the AI tool is data protection compliant and takes place on the HU servers; personal information or personal data remains confidential. The tool can be used via the HU account.

Serious allegations of abuse have been levelled against physicist Erwin Schrödinger in recent years. In the course of the debate, the possible renaming of the Erwin Schrödinger Centre at HU was also discussed. Scientists Magdalena and Martin Gronau presented new findings at a lecture in Adlershof on 18 November after viewing Schrödinger's previously blocked diaries. They have studied these and other important sources in detail and come to the conclusion that the accusations levelled against Schrödinger are not justified.

Public Engagement: Networking event between Oxford and Berlin

On the topic of 'Researching with Society - International Perspectives', scientists and science-related stakeholders came together at the Helmholtz Centre's Animal Anatomy Theatre and Object Laboratory on 20 November. The aim was to exchange ideas on how research with society can succeed. The programme included workshops, a network bingo organised by the BUA's Laboratory for Interdisciplinary Research and a keynote presented by Dr Victoria McGuinness, Head of the Oxford Research Centre in the Humanities at the University of Oxford. She emphasised the changing role of universities - from a static teaching institution to an open space for discourse in which everyone can participate - and at the same time highlighted the importance of every researcher as a 'doorway in the university' for non-academic communities.

Excellence Strategy: Berlin competes with ten projects

In the coming weeks and months, teams of Berlin scientists will be travelling to Bonn to present and defend their research ideas as part of the Excellence Strategy funded by the federal government. There is a lot at stake: the four renowned partners in the Berlin University Alliance (BUA), Freie Universität, Humboldt-Universität zu Berlin, Charité - Universitätsmedizin Berlin and Technische Universität are applying for a seven-year extension of the seven research clusters currently being funded. In addition, three new applications with Berlin participation will be entered into the competition.

DFG Funding Atlas 2024: BUA's research strength confirmed

In the current funding atlas of the German Research Foundation (DFG), Freie Universität and Humboldt-Universität are once again among the strongest research universities in Germany. They are ranked first and second in the humanities and social sciences. Among the university hospitals, Charité - Universitätsmedizin Berlin occupies the top position. In terms of per capita funding, researchers at Technische Universität Berlin are in the lead across Germany in the natural sciences, humanities and social sciences. In the reporting years 2020 to 2022, researchers in the Excellence Network received a total of 716.21 million euros in funding from the DFG. This corresponds to an increase of 8.4 per cent compared to the previous reporting period from 2017 to 2019. The DFG presents key figures on publicly funded research every three years.

Honorary position: Jürg Kramer new President of the German Mathematical Society

In November, Prof Dr Jürg Kramer was appointed as the new President of the German Mathematical Society (DMV) by the Executive Committee. Kramer, who joined the Institute of Mathematics as a professor in 1994 and retired this year, has made a name for himself in the field of didactics of mathematics in particular. He was particularly committed to the promotion of young academics and the professionalisation of teaching staff. Kramer held numerous positions: He was spokesman for the Berlin Mathematical School graduate school and two graduate programmes of the German Research Foundation. He was also a member of the board of the Berlin Cluster of Excellence MATH+.

Honour: 'Research with Responsibility' science prize awarded

The Stifterverband has announced this year's winners of the 40,000 euro science prize: Robert Arlinghaus from the Leibniz Institute of Freshwater Ecology and Inland Fisheries is being honoured for his work on the ecological, economic and social aspects of inland recreational fishing. Lena Hipp from the Social Science Research Centre Berlin receives the prize for her research on social inequalities related to gender and care responsibilities.
